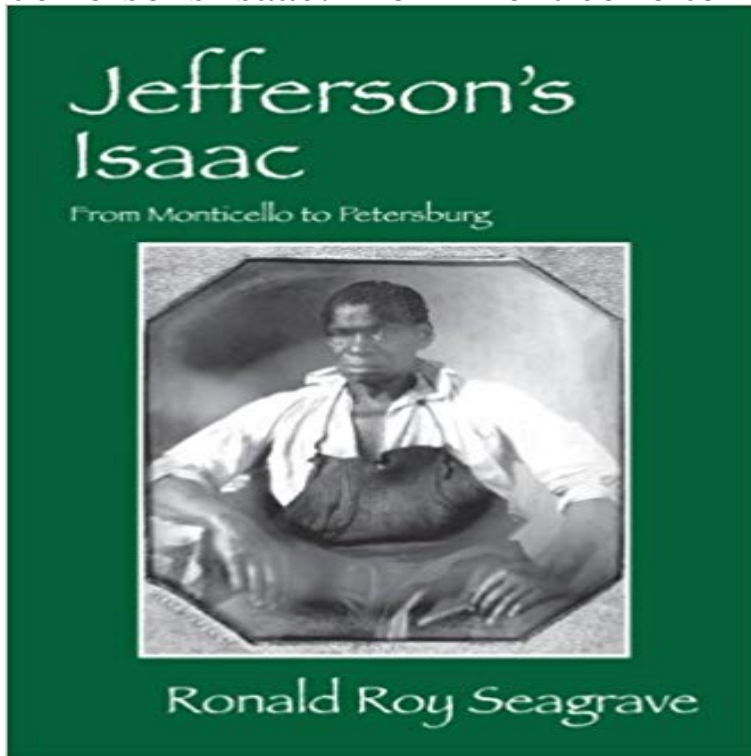


Jeffersons Isaac: From Monticello to Petersburg



To deny a people their history is to deny them the most essential element of their groups existence. Ronald Seagrave In an 1840s daguerreotype, former slave Isaac stares blankly at the camera. He is a large man and his big hands hang in the foreground of the image. There is no smile. He is a laborer, dressed in work clothes, and he is now considered a Free Person of Color. The photo had been taken by a Caucasian, just as later in life Isaacs biography had been written in the voice of a white man neither of Isaacs race nor of his social class. Isaacs photo and his biography exhibit the glaring, weary stoicism that became emblematic of the entire African-American population of the Old Dominion. Theirs was a history filtered through the same white lens that captured the Plantation Legend of the Old South, where happy slaves were content with masters who were always kind and fair. In Jeffersons Isaac: From Monticello to Petersburg historian Ronald Seagrave removes the distorting white inflections from Isaacs narrative and tells his story in a true voice, starting with his days as a slave of Thomas Jefferson, the author of the Declaration of Independence, but also the owner of more than six hundred slaves, only two of whom he set free in his lifetime. Isaacs story, freshly told by Seagrave, reveals the contradictions and duplicity of Jefferson and of the American ante-bellum era as the author finally gives Isaac the opportunity to say to the world what it was like to live then as a chattel.
